This edition provides the first English translations of two short-story collections by the Austrian writer Elsa Asenijeff. Now remembered primarily as the lover and muse of sculptor and painter Max Klinger, Asenijeff was a widely read author in her day. Both books engage

with "the woman question" at the turn of the twentieth century: Asenijeff thematizes the lack of education and professional opportunities for women and girls, critiques the bourgeois family as a site of patriarchal power, and sheds light on systemic sexual violence. A contextualizing introduction places Asenijeff in 19th- and 20th-century women's writing in the German-speaking world.



The Memoirs of Ceija Stojka, Child Survivor of the Romani Holocaust

"Is this the whole world?" This question begins the first of three memoirs by Austrian Romani writer, visual artist, musician, and activist Ceija Stojka (1933-2013), told from her perspective as a child interned in three Nazi concentration camps from age nine to fifteen.

Written by a child survivor much later in life, the memoirs offer insights into the nexus of narrative and extreme trauma, expressing the full spectrum of human emotions. They also show how Stojka navigated male-dominated postwar Austrian and Romani culture. Besides containing the first complete English translations of the memoirs, the book includes poems and an interview as well as historical photographs and reproductions of several of Stojka's artworks.



Grete Meisel-Hess (1879-1922) was a feminist voice in early-twentieth-century modernist discourse. Born in Prague to Jewish parents and raised in Vienna, she became a literary presence with her 1902 novel *Fanny Roth*. Influenced by many of her contemporaries, she

also criticized their notions of gender and sexuality. Moving to Berlin, she continued writing fiction and began publishing on sexology and the women's movement. This book, the first on Meisel-Hess in English, combines a literary-cultural exploration of modernism in Vienna and Berlin with a biography of Meisel-Hess and a critical analysis of her works.



In the 1960s and 70s, sexuality and art/literature entered into a remarkably intimate and mutually beneficial relationship: on the one hand, scientific theories of sexuality and their pop-psychological counterparts incorporated lengthy reflections on art movements and literary texts, since artistic media were understood as crucial to the project of inventing radically new modes of human living and loving. On the other hand, the aesthetic ambitions that informed new conceptions of sexuality had their mirror image in forms of sexual obsession that characterized contemporary aesthetic theories. The approaches of Adorno, Barthes, Sontag, Fiedler, Gorsen, and Herbert and Ludwig Marcuseall contributed to a dramatic eroticization of the arts. Christine Weder's interdisciplinary study explores this neglected relationship, yielding a dual insight into an era of profound transformation.

Germany has long defined itself in opposition to an imagined eastern "Other" Central to the consideration of such projections is the legacy of the Second World War. But despite Western rediscovery of the events on the Eastern Front, mass immigration to

Germany from the east, and intensive contact between German speakers and its cultures, German-language cultural production still tends to represent Eastern Europe as unknown, wild, and inaccessible. By contrast, the writers and filmmakers under discussion here put forward alternative perspectives. 

Transcultural Memory and European Identity in Contemporary German-Jewish Migrant Literature

IESSICA ORTNER



Preserving the memory of the Holocaust as a moral and ethical limit case is key to the European Union's attempt to construct a pan-European identity. But with the EU's Eastern expansion, new member states have challenged the Holocaust's singularity,

calling for the traumas of the Stalinist Gulag to be acknowledged explicitly. Thus Europe, unified politically, is divided by its perceptions of the past. Jessica Ortner argues that German-Jewish writers from Eastern Europe and the GDR who migrated westwards during or after the Cold War have worked, through what she calls their "literature of mnemonic migration," to widen European cultural memory to include the traumatic experiences of the East. The writers she focuses on are Katja Petrowskaja, Olga Grjasnowa, Lena Gorelik, Vladimir Vertlib, and Barbara Honigmann. Their writings criticize the memory politics of both Germany and the Soviet Union, address the politically explosive question of how to remember both National Socialism and Communism, and discuss the status of Jews in contemporary Germany.



The Last Laugh

SAMUEL FREDERICK

A masterpiece of silent cinema, F.W. Murnau's *The Last Laugh* (1924) stars the larger-than-life Emil Jannings as a proud hotel porter demoted to lowly washroom attendant. His misfortune becomes a tragic turning point in a social drama as much about the struggling Weimar Republic, still recovering from hyperinflation, as about its working-class citizens. Sam Frederick shows that Murnau's film is similarly transitional: born at the crossroads between the Expressionist style of the early '20s and the emerging aesthetics of New Objectivity, it is at once soberly realistic and oneirically distorted.

The Marriage of Maria Braun

PRISCILLA LAYNE

The Marriage of Maria Braun is the most popular film by Rainer Werner Fassbinder, the leading exponent of the "New German Cinema." The protagonist, Maria, attempts to navigate the poverty and sexism of immediate postwar Germany through her relationships with men, only to discover that she has been a pawn in a power game between her husband and her lover Bill, an African-American GI. Yet Maria is also complicit in racism and white patriarchy, a fact barely registered in scholarship until now. Priscilla Layne draws on archival research, Critical Race Theory, Black Feminist Thought, and Critical Whiteness Studies to expand on the role of race and gender in the film.

Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827) is recognized the world over as a composer of musical masterpieces exhibiting heroic strength, particularly in the face of his increasing deafness from ca. 1798. By 1818, the Viennese composer had begun carrying blank booklets

with him, for his acquaintances to jot their sides of conversations, while he answered aloud. Today, 139 of these booklets survive, covering the years 1818 up to the composer's death in 1827 and including such topics as music, history, politics, art, literature, theatre, religion, and education. These important booklets are here translated into English in their entirety for the first time. The volumes in this series include an updated editorial apparatus, with revised and expanded notes and many new footnotes exclusive to this edition, and brand new introductions, which together place many of the quickly changing conversational topics into context. Due to the editor's many years of research in Vienna, this edition represents an entirely new venture in source studies.


