

### Documenting Violence in Calderón's Mexico

Visual Culture, Resistance and Memorialisation IESSICA WAX-EDWARDS



In Mexico, during the presidency of Felipe Calderón (2006-2012), at least 60,000 people were killed, tens of thousands were 'disappeared' and countless more were subjected to kidnapping and sexual violence. This book analyses how artists and filmmakers attempted to navigate and contend with this escalation in brutality.

The texts studied here provide a visual archive of this first phase in the drug war and show how artists including Pedro Pardo, Fernando Brito, Mónica González and Natalia Almada challenge official narratives and seek justice for citizens. Bringing together

photography, photojournalism, documentary and short fiction cinema, the book argues for the vital role of cultural production in documenting institutional corruption, human rights abuses and narco-related violence as well as in providing a space to grieve and remember the victims. Mexico's visual cultural legacy provides a means of understanding and responding to the violence as the socio-political landscape continues to deteriorate.



How did liberationist Christianity develop in Argentina between the 1930s and early 1970s? How did it respond to state terrorism during the Dirty War?

This book reveals that ecclesial and political conflicts were at the heart of the construction of a liberationist Christian identity. It situates the rise of a revolutionary Christian impulse within changes in society, in Catholicism and Protestantism and in Marxism in the 1930s, before analysing how the phenomenon coalesced in the late sixties into a coherent social movement. It examines the responses of liberationist Christians to the intense repression under the presidency of Isabel Perón and the rule of the military


junta between 1974 and 1983. Overall, it offers a fresh analysis of a movement that occupies a major role in the popular memory of the period of state terror.



#### **Imagining Ecuador**

Crisis, Transnationalism and Contemporary Fiction Luis A. Medina Cordova



How are contemporary authors reimagining the idea of 'Ecuador' following the worst financial crisis in the nation's history?

In March 1999, in an effort to stave off financial collapse, the national government froze all bank accounts in Ecuador for a period of five days. This episode, the *Feriado Bancario*, had far-reaching and long-lasting effects on society, politics, the economy, and cultural production. The very idea of 'Ecuador' transformed as Ecuador became a country marked by constant interaction with the world beyond its borders. This book explores how contemporary Ecuadorian authors are reimagining the nation following the *Feriado* 

Bancario. The book posits that four post-crisis novels — Eliécer Cárdenas' El oscuro final del Porvenir (2000), Leonardo Valencia's Kazbek (2008), Carlos Arcos' Memorias de Andrés Chiliquinga (2013) and Gabriela Alemán's Humo (2017) — reflect and explain the new reality of Ecuador as a nation no longer defined by its territory. At the same time, the book uses the Ecuadorian case to challenge the conceptualisation of Latin American literature as 'post-national'.



The centuries-old European genre of the coming-of-age story has

While attention to Afro-Hispanic and Afro-Brazilian literature has increased in recent decades, few critics have focused specifically on the Afro-Latin American *Bildungsroman*. In this study, author Bonnie Wasserman provides a far-reaching and compassionate analysis of novels by eight major writers from the Spanish-speaking Caribbean and Brazil, exploring such important themes as the intergenerational effects of slavery, the pull of immigration, and the influence of religion on young people's lives.





# The Epic Mirror

Poetry, Conflict Ethics and Political Community in Colonial Peru IMOGEN CHOI



How did Spanish-American writers and veterans in the late sixteenth and early seventeenth century use epic poetry to search for ethical solutions to the violent conflicts of their age? Working across the fields of Hispanic literature,

the history of political thought, and studies of empire, colonialism and globalisation this book reinterprets three major works of colonial Latin American literature: Alonso de Ercilla's *La Araucana* (1569-90), Pedro de Oña's *Arauco domado* (1596) and Juan de Miramontes Zuázola's *Armas antárticas* (1608-9). The wars that are the subjects of these poems took place at the frontiers of the Spanish empire, where new political communities were emerging: fiercely independent Amerindian republics, rebellious Spanish settlers, maroon kingdoms of fugitive African slaves. This colonial reality generated a distinctive vision of just warfare and political community, here revealed through the imaginative mirrors of epic.



# Security and Illegality in Cuba's Transition to Democracy

How can an environment be created in Cuba in which safety is not sacrificed for more open markets and politics?

Today, relatively good security and a stable political system coexist with widespread illegality in Cuba. But

as restrictions are eased, the average citizen is becoming less secure. This book examines present security conditions and forecasts the effects that economic and social liberalization could have on levels of criminality. Based on both quantitative and qualitative data including in-depth interviews with experts and observational research in Cuba itself, the book seeks to identify the risks associated with liberalization and to explore workable solutions. More broadly, it aims to shed light on how the negative consequences of social and economic liberalization can be minimized for the average citizen during periods of political transition from authoritarian systems.



#### **Decolonising the Museum**

The Curation of Indigenous Contemporary Art in Brazil

Explores the scope that there is for Indigenous curatorial agency in the relationship of Indigenous contemporary art with the 'art world'.

After a brief introduction to Indigenous art, this study gives an overview of the evolving

relationship between Indigenous art and the 'art world', exploring in particular the nature of decolonial and/or Indigenous curatorial practice both in Brazil and elsewhere in the world. It then hones in on a recent exhibition: 'Arte Eletrônica Indígena' [Indigenous Electronic Art], held at the Museum of Modern Art of Bahia in Salvador in August 2018. Based on participant observation and interviews, it provides an ethnographic reading of the opening weekend of the exhibition, looking at the alternative modalities of Indigenous curatorial agency that were exercised by the Indigenous people present. The conclusion explores the legacy of the 'Arte Eletrônica Indígena' exhibition, particularly for the Indigenous communities involved, and looks to the evidence provided by the exhibition for lessons for future exhibitions.



### The Spanish Baroque and Latin American Literary Modernity

This book develops a broader view of Hispanic modernity, tracing a motif of recurring impasse, first seen in peninsular Baroque texts and continuing into Latin American colonial and modern literature.

Inspired by Walter Benjamin's notion of constellation, this book draws on theories of Latin American modernity to investigate the Spanish literary Baroque and its repetitions as a historical-cultural predicament in Latin American colonial and modern texts. Inca Garcilaso, Borges, Carpentier, Rulfo, Darío and a range of Latin American 'Post-Symbolist' poets are juxtaposed with the Lazarillo, the Quijote, Fuenteovejuna and Góngora's Soledades to produce original readings on topics of violence, rape, frustrated pilgrimage and the truncated ambitions of colonized peoples and confessional minorities. The book addresses Spanish and Latin American criticism and emerging theoretical concerns within comparative literature.

#### Fashion, Gender and Agency in Latin American and Spanish Literature

In the last two decades, the glorification of sewing - whether involving needlework, tailoring, or fashion design - has thrived in Latin American and Iberian cultural works, particularly literature. This book examines the depiction of women and

the textile arts in contemporary Hispanic and Brazilian literature. Employing space and gender theories, the book explores how sewing, traditionally viewed as respectable only if practiced at home, gives agency and encourages self-reflection and mobility, allowing protagonists to transgress physical and socially prescribed limits. Texts include María Dueñas's El tiempo entre costuras (2009), César Aira's La costurera y el viento (1994), Pedro Lemebel's Tengo miedo torero (2001), Frances Ponte de Peebles's The Seamstress (2009), and children's stories. Encouraging readers to look behind garments to agents of production, the book shows how contemporary authors renew interest in sewing, tailoring, upcycling, and embroidery.




