

Book Club Ideas

Book clubs are about reading good books, of course, but they're also about so much more: making connections, enjoying delicious snacks, socializing with friends, considering new perspectives and ideas, and maybe even learning or trying something new.

Why not discuss the novel while enjoying good food? These recipes are great to make for your book club discussions, whether you're gathering in person or virtually.

Crispy GREEK LEMON POTATOES



Ingredients:

7 large potatoes
3 cloves of garlic, minced
3/4 cup olive oil
3/4 cup water

1 tablespoon dried oregano juice of 2 lemons 1 teaspoon semolina salt and freshly ground pepper

Instructions:

Preheat the oven to 200C / 400F

Cut the potatoes into wedges and place them on a large metal roasting pan. Into a bowl add the remaining ingredients (including the semolina and the 3/4 cup of water) and blend; pour the semolina-lemon mixture over the potatoes and season well with salt and pepper.

Bake for 40 minutes, until a nice golden crust has formed on the potatoes; take them out of the oven, toss them a little bit to bring them upside down, sprinkle with a pinch of oregano and put back into the oven for another 30-40 minutes. If all of the liquid has been absorbed and the pan appears to be getting dry, add 1/4-1/2 of a cup hot water into the pan or some extra lemon mixture, before they have fully browned.

The secret for these extra crispy Greek lemon potatoes is to sprinkle the potatoes with some semolina, as it helps to form a nice golden crust around them. Don't be afraid of over baking them – they will become even more delicious.





Ingredients:

3 tomatoes, cut into wedges
1 medium red onion, sliced into rings
1 cucumber, sliced into thick half-moons
1 green pepper, sliced
16 black or green olives
7 ounces of block feta cheese
1 tbsp red wine vinegar
1/4 of a cup extra virgin olive oil
1 teaspoon dried oregano
sea salt

The secret to make a delicious Greek salad is in the ingredients: juicy tomatoes, crisp cucumber, creamy feta cheese, good quality extra virgin olive oil and some tangy black olives will really make a difference.

Instructions:

Wash vegetables thoroughly and strain.

Cut the tomatoes into wedges, slice the onion into thin rings, cut the cucumber in thick slices and place everything in a large bowl. Don't forget to add the olives as well.

Season with salt and pour over the extra virgin olive oil and vinegar. Toss everything together, so that the flavors mix. Be careful not to add too much salt, as the feta cheese and the olives are salty enough.

Greek salad is always served with feta cheese on top, a drizzle of olive oil and dried oregano. Enjoy your delicious Greek salad as a side dish or as a light summer meal with lots of crusty bread aside.

Book Club Discussion Activity

Discussion Questions

These discussion questions can also be found on pages 387 and 388 of the book.

- Best friends Katerina and Marco share a bond that transcends time and place and the many challenges of their lives. What is it about their shared childhood experiences that bonded them to one another in such a way? Do you have a friendship from childhood that has stayed with you and left a lasting impact on you?
- The power and magic of a mother's love is explored though the little-known myth of the goddess Nyx. While she is traditionally depicted as a dark and dangerous character, Nyx is also revealed to be a benevolent protector of mothers and their children. How is Nyx symbolic of the duality of motherhood and what mothers are capable of?
- Yianna's and Marlena's stories speak to the depths that a mother would go to save her child. What do you think of Yianna's and Marlena's choices and sacrifices? How are they similar? How are they different?
- As the rest of the world was celebrating the end of World War II, Greece was plunged into a deadly and dangerous civil war, and yet, little is known about the war outside of Greece. To this day, many families in Greece do not freely discuss this time, as the memories are too painful. What are your thoughts on the trauma of survivors and the importance of discussing and documenting history, however painful it is to recall? What role does fiction play in bringing these often- forgotten stories to life?

Discussion Questions

- The pull of home is one that drives Katerina and Marco as well as members of the Greek royal family. What does home mean to you? Where do you consider home, and why?
- Marco's journey comes full circle as he recites Cavafy's poem, "Ithaka," to Katerina on the grounds of Mon Repos. How does this poem reflect their relationship? What does the poem mean to you? Has there been a journey in your life, however difficult, that you have learned and grown from?
- The story of the Greek monarchy is explored and told, starting with the enthronement of King George I in 1864 to the return of exiled King Constantine to Greece in 2013 as a private citizen. What are your thoughts on the monarchy? Do you believe the idea of a monarchy is antiquated or can it be beneficial to a country and how?
- When Violetta shares her family's tragedy, she explains why her house is always filled with family, friends, and chaos, saying, "Anything is better than the silence." After experiencing so much loss and trauma in her own life, how does Violetta's story affect and change Katerina?
- Olotho tells Katerina that dreams can, "help you examine what's behind you or to better examine yourself. Sometimes, in the black of night, dreams help us see what we often overlook in the light of day." Katerina and Dawn both see a golden woman in their dreams. Who do you think the golden woman is? Have you ever had a dream you felt was a premonition or a prophecy?
