



Try a recipe: Sunset Sour



In this gorgeous Boston-type sour, a touch of blackberry liqueur supports the blackberry cobbler notes from the simple syrup, and the black walnut bitters add a nutty note to balance the flavors. With just a blackberry as garnish, this cocktail looks as amazing as it tastes.

11/2 ounces 100-proof bourbon

1/2 ounce blackberry liqueur

34 ounce lemon juice

3/4 ounce blackberry simple syrup (recipe follows)

3/4 ounce egg whites or aquafaba (optional)

2 dashes Fee Brothers black walnut bitters

Garnish: fresh or frozen blackberries and lemon slice


Combine ingredients in a cocktail shaker and fill with ice. Shake vigorously for 10-12 seconds. Strain into a chilled coupe glass or, if you used the egg whites or aquafaba, strain into another shaker and use a handheld latte whisk for 20 seconds. Pour into a chilled coupe glass and garnish.

Blackberry Simple Syrup

2 cups frozen blackberries ½ cup water

1 cup sugar

Combine ingredients in a small saucepan and cook until the blackberries are thawed, soft, and very juicy. Once the blackberries have cooked down a bit, press on them to release the juice. Stir until the sugar is dissolved and the blackberries have turned purple. Cool and strain out the pulp. Store the syrup in the fridge and save the strained blackberries to eat on ice cream.

Ginseng Diggers

A History of Root and Herb Gathering in Appalachia

Luke Manget

The harvesting of wild American ginseng (*panax quinquefolium*), the gnarled, aromatic herb known for its therapeutic and healing properties, is deeply established in North America and has played an especially vital role in the southern and central Appalachian Mountains. Traded through a trans-Pacific network that connected the region to East Asian markets, ginseng was but one of several medicinal Appalachian plants that entered international webs of exchange. As the production of patent medicines and botanical pharmaceutical products escalated in the mid- to late-nineteenth century, southern Appalachia emerged as the United States' most prolific supplier of many species of medicinal plants. The region achieved this distinction because of its biodiversity and the persistence of certain common rights that guaranteed widespread access to the forested mountainsides, regardless of who owned the land.

Following the Civil War, root digging and herb gathering became one of the most important ways landless families and small farmers earned income from the forest commons. This boom influenced class relations, gender roles, forest use, and outside perceptions of Appalachia, and began a widespread renegotiation of common rights that eventually curtailed access to ginseng and other plants.

Based on extensive research into the business records of mountain entrepreneurs, country stores, and pharmaceutical companies, *Ginseng Diggers: A History of Root and Herb Gathering in Appalachia* is the first book to unearth the unique relationship between the Appalachian region and the global trade in medicinal plants. Historian Luke Manget expands our understanding of the gathering commons by exploring how and why Appalachia became the nation's premier purveyor of botanical drugs in the late-nineteenth century and how the trade influenced the way residents of the region interacted with each other and the forests around them.

Luke Manget is assistant professor of history at Dalton State College in Dalton, Georgia. He is a contributor to *Southern Communities: Identity, Conflict, and Memory in the Nineteenth-Century American South*, edited by Steven E. Nash and Bruce E. Stewart.






In *Being Here*, Manini Nayar brings together a finely crafted collection of interconnected stories that follow "the daily miracle" of her characters' inner lives. Nayar brings to the forefront immigrant women making their way in the world as mothers, as wives, as outliers, and as rebels. She writes about their insistence on autonomy, the absurdity of the struggles they face, and their occasional triumphs.

These stories loop and double back across time and locales, linking characters through memory while illumining lives forever changed by an offhand phrase, an act of will, or an unsought encounter. Readers will meet a wide array of characters, but it is Nina with whom they will become most familiar, as she appears throughout the collection: first, as a young wife brought to the US by her husband, Siddharth Vellodi; second, as an older sister; and third, as a divorced mother whose daughter's fateful rebellion remains the mysterious and incandescent center of the stories. Nayar's exploration of inward lives as the locus of dramatic action and events allows both characters and readers to grapple with simply being. In doing so, Nayar reveals the performative aspects of language—particularly its ability to create, destroy, and heal connections.

In poetic and eloquent prose, *Being Here* constructs a luminous collage of restless immigrants united by their shared deference to a brave new journey. In their burgeoning voices another America is found, both latent and radiantly alive.

Manini Nayar is associate teaching professor of English and women's studies at Penn State. Her award-winning stories have been broadcast by the BBC World Service and published in *Boston Review, Shenandoah, Bellevue Literary Review, London Magazine, Stand, The Malahat Review,* and *Alaska Quarterly Review.*

When authorities converged on the Guyanese settlement of the Peoples Temple Agricultural Project—led by James "Jim" Jones and popularly known as Jonestown—on November 18, 1978, more than nine hundred members were found dead, the result of murder-suicide. The massacre was the largest mass loss of American lives before September 11, 2001. Although the events at Jonestown inspired a common idiom in "don't drink the Kool-Aid," the personal histories of those who were lost have been treated as a footnote to the tragedy—little has been written about those individuals and their lived experiences.

In this profound and provocative poetry collection, darlene anita scott foregrounds that which has been disremembered and honors the people who perished at Jonestown. She amplifies the voices of the children, teenagers, and adults whose hopes, dreams, and lives were just as hopeful and mundane as any others yet have been overlooked and overshadowed by the circumstances of their untimely loss. The distinct, haunting, and unforgettable poems in *Marrow* cut to the bone while also acknowledging and giving tribute to the people who were lost on that fateful day.

darlene anita scott is coeditor of *Revisiting the Elegy in the Black Lives Matter Era*. Her poetry appeared most recently in *Green Mountains Review, Pen* + *Brush*, and *Simple Machines* and her works have been nominated for the Pushcart Prize and Best of the Net.

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



Hounds on the Mountain

James Still

First published in 1937, *Hounds on the Mountain* evokes James Still's personal experiences of eastern Kentucky through reflective folk poems describing Appalachian mountain life from birth through death. Written during the Great Depression, the collection emphasizes a collective reliance on the earth and the primacy of nature that Still observed from the seclusion of his thirty-acre home in Knott County, Kentucky.

Still, who became known as the "Dean of Appalachian Literature," describes the changing landscape of his community as a tale of personal and environmental erosion. As the poet pleads for his readers to better protect this fragile ecosphere, he plants the seeds for his rise to literary eminence. Still's focus on the self-made authenticity of regional community artisans also reminded American readers during the Great Depression that local economies needed support, the same as those at the national and global levels. *Hounds on the Mountain* allows today's audiences to appreciate Still's first published book as both literature and as a treasured cultural symbol of Appalachian life then and now.

James Still (1906–2001) was the author of several works of fiction and poetry, including *River of Earth, The Wolfpen Poems*, and *From the Mountain, From the Valley: New and Collected Poems*.



On Troublesome Creek

James Still

James Still left eastern Kentucky for Europe in 1941 after enlisting in the US Army during World War II, leaving behind a recently published, semi-autobiographical work of fiction, *On Troublesome Creek*. Even as he developed a broader worldview, his work continued to draw from the agrarian and regional sources of life in the Cumberland Plateau that supported the American war effort. Like the riverbeds and creeks he so often evoked, Still reminds readers of the local and regional founts that they were fighting for in the century's second global war. The "Dean of Appalachian Literature," James Still grew up in Alabama before settling down in Knott County, Kentucky, in the early 1930s. In *On Troublesome Creek*, he describes the ebbs and flows of Appalachian living while celebrating the culture defined by family, self-sufficiency, and hard work. The colloquial dialogue brings to life a community attached to the land on which they had lived for generations and the victuals and rituals that kept their world in motion amidst uncertainty.

James Still (1906–2001) was the author of several works of fiction and poetry, including *River of Earth, The Wolfpen Poems*, and *From the Mountain, From the Valley: New and Collected Poems*.

From the anti-segregation sit-ins of the 1960s to the 2020 protests in response to the killing of Breonna Taylor, the rest of the nation—and often the world—has watched as Kentuckians boldly fought against injustice. In *Resistance in the Bluegrass*, Farrah Alexander outlines how Kentucky's activists have opposed racism, discrimination, economic inequality, and practices that accelerate climate change; advocated for better education, more humane immigration policies, and appropriate political representation; and supported LGBTQ+ and women's rights, while also celebrating decades of Kentucky contributions to social justice movements and the people behind them.

Resistance in the Bluegrass gives engaged citizens—and those who aim to become more engaged—inspiration and guidance for how they too can make a difference across the commonwealth. With interviews and issue-by-issue action items, Alexander reminds her readers that everyday citizens who step up to make a difference are at the heart of all social change. James Baker Hall (1935–2009), Kentucky's poet laureate for 2001, was the author of many books including *The Total Light Process* and *Yates Paul, His Grand Flights, His Tootings*.

The Queen of Technicolor

Maria Montez in Hollywood

Tom Zimmerman

Best known for her appearances in the six Technicolor "Neverland" movies, Maria Montez (1912-1951) is a film icon. Growing up as one of ten children in the Dominican Republic, her rise as a film star in the United States seemed unlikely. In 1939, Montez set off on her own to New York City to fulfill her aspirations of movie stardom. Despite having no substantial acting experience, Montez managed to sign with major agent Louis Schurr who helped her secure a contract with Universal Studios before she moved out to Hollywood.

Following her arrival in Los Angeles, Montez began cultivating the larger-than-life persona for which she is known. Her beauty, personality, and series of publicity stunts, including dramatic restaurant entrances, endeared her to the press. She even created her own fan club—The Montez for Stardom Club. Her ambitious self-promotion bolstered the success she found with her first big lead in *Arabian Nights*, released in 1943. From then on, the studio referred to her as "The Queen of Technicolor."

Author Tom Zimmerman puts Montez's life in historical context, including her role as a cultural icon and a living representation of the United States' Good Neighbor Policy with Latin American countries. With her thick Dominican accent, Montez struggled to make herself intelligible to an American audience. However, unlike some of her Latin contemporaries, she did not present herself as a caricature of her culture or use her accent for comedic purposes, giving her credibility with Latin American audiences. Zimmerman skillfully recounts the story of Montez's fiery ambition and her ascent to Hollywood fame, giving her legacy the opportunity to live on.

Tom Zimmerman is a photographer who has permanent collections in the United States Library of Congress, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, the Motion Picture and Television Photo Archive, and the Fortress of Peter and Paul in St. Petersburg, Russia, among others. He is the author of *Paradise Promoted: The Booster Campaign that Created Los Angeles 1870-1930, Downtown in Detail: Close-Up on the Historic Buildings of Los Angeles*, and *Spectacular Illumination: Neon Los Angeles*, 1925–1965.









History by HBO

Televising the American Past

Rebecca Weeks

The television industry is changing, and with it, the small screen's potential to engage in debate and present valuable representations of American history. Founded in 1972, HBO has been at the forefront of these changes, leading the way for many network, cable, and streaming services into the "post-network" era. Despite this, most scholarship has been dedicated to analyzing historical feature films and documentary films, leaving TV and the long-form drama hungry for coverage.

In *History by HBO: Televising the American Past*, Rebecca Weeks fills the gap in this area of media studies and defends the historiographic power of long-form dramas. By focusing on this change and its effects, *History by HBO* outlines how history is crafted on television and the diverse forms it can take. Weeks examines the capabilities of the long-form serial for engaging with historical stories, insisting that the shift away from the network model and toward narrowcasting has enabled challenging histories to thrive in home settings. As an examination of HBO's unique structure for producing quality historical dramas, Weeks provides four case studies of HBO series set during different periods of United States history: *Band of Brothers* (2001), *Deadwood* (2004–2007), *Boardwalk Empire* (2012–2014), and *Treme* (2010–2013). In each case, HBO's lack of advertiser influence, commitment to creative freedom, and generous budgets continue to draw and retain talent who want to tell historical stories.

Balancing historical and film theories in her assessment of the roles of mise-en-scène, characterization, narrative complexity, and sound in the production of effective historical dramas, Weeks' evaluation acts as an ode to the most recent Golden Age of TV, as well as a critical look at the relationship between entertainment media and collective memory.

Rebecca Weeks is a lecturer in the Bachelor of Art and Design Programme at Media Design School in Auckland, New Zealand. She was the recipient of the Dame Joan Metge Post-Doctoral Research Award.

Norms in Conflict

Southeast Asia's Response to Human Rights Violations in Myanmar



The people of Myanmar were struck by three major human rights disasters during the country's period of democratization from 2003 to 2012: the 2007 Saffron Revolution, the aftermath of Cyclone Nargis in 2008, and the 2012 Rakhine riots, which would evolve into the ongoing Rohingya crisis. These events saw Myanmar's government categorically labeled as an offender of human rights, and three powerful Southeast Asian member states—Indonesia, Thailand, and Malaysia—responded to the violations in very different ways. In each case, their responses to the crises were explicitly shaped by norm conflict, which may be understood as a tension between international and domestic norms. Their reactions were compelled by a need to address conflicting domestic and international expectations for norm compliance regarding human rights protection and non-interference in internal affairs.

In Norms in Conflict: Southeast Asia's Response to Human Rights Violations in Myanmar, Anchalee Rüland makes sense of state action that occurs when a governing body is faced with a circumstance that is at once in line with and contrary to its own governing policies. She defines five different types of response strategies to situations of norm conflict and examines the enabling factors that lead to each strategy. Domestic norms are known to evolve as a country's values change over time yet Rüland argues that the old and new norms may also coexist; knowledge of the underlying political context is crucial for those seeking a solid understanding of state behavior. Norms in Conflict challenges the conventional understanding of the logic of consequences in determining state behavior, advancing constructivist theory and establishing a provocative new conversation in international relations discourse.



In *War & Homecoming: Veteran Identity and the Post-9/11 Generation*, Travis L. Martin explores how a new generation of veterans is redefining what it means to come home. More than 2.7 million veterans served in Iraq and Afghanistan. Their homecomings didn't include parades or national celebrations. Instead, when the last US troops left Afghanistan, American veterans raised millions of dollars for the evacuation of Afghan refugees, especially those who'd served alongside them. This brand of selflessness is one reason civilians regard veterans with reverence and pride.

The phrase "thank you for your service" is ubiquitous. Yet, one in ten post-9/11 veterans struggles with substance abuse. Fifteen to twenty veterans die by suicide every day. Veterans aged eighteen to thirty-four die at the highest rates, leading advocates to focus on concepts like moral injury and collective belonging when addressing psychic wounds. Martin argues that many veterans struggle due to decades of stereotyping and a lack of healthy models of veteran identity. In the American unconscious, veterans are treated as either the superficially praised "hero" or the victimized "wounded warrior," forever defined by past accomplishments. They are often appropriated as symbols in competing narratives of national identity. War & Homecoming critically examines representations of veterans in patriotic rhetoric, popular media, literature, and the lives of those who served. From this analysis, a new veteran identity emerges—veterans as storytellers who reject stereotypes, claim their symbolic authority, and define themselves through literature, art, and service. Their dynamic approach to life after military service allows for continued growth, agency, individuality, and inspiring examples of resilience for others.

Travis L. Martin is founding director of the Kentucky Center for Veterans Studies at Eastern Kentucky University. He has established several nationally recognized programs to support returning veterans in higher education and the nonprofit sector. A scholar of American literature, psychoanalytic trauma theory, and social theory, Martin presents frequently at conferences and universities. He has published dozens of research articles and creative short works on veterans' issues. As a sergeant in the US Army, he served during two deployments in the Iraq War (2003–2004 and 2005).


The Father of American Military Cryptology

Betsy Rohaly Smoot

"Success in dealing with unknown ciphers is measured by these four things in the order named: perseverance, careful methods of analysis, intuition, luck." So begins the first chapter of Colonel Parker Hitt's 1916 *Manual for the Solution of Military Ciphers*, a foundational text in the history of cryptology. An irrepressible innovator, Hitt possessed those qualities in abundance. His manual, cipher devices, and proactive mentorship of Army cryptology during World War I laid the groundwork for the modern American cryptologic system. Though he considered himself an infantryman, Hitt is best known as the "father of American military cryptology."

In Parker Hitt: The Father of American Military Cryptology, Betsy Rohaly Smoot brings Hitt's legacy to life, chronicling his upbringing, multiple careers, ingenious mind, and independent spirit. In the 1910s, after a decade as an infantry officer, Hitt set his sights on aviation. Instead, he was drawn to the applied sciences, designing signal and machine-gun equipment while applying math to combat problems. Atypical for the time, Hitt championed women in the workplace. During World War I he suggested the Army employ American female telephone operators, while his wife, Genevieve Young Hitt, became the first woman to break ciphers for the United States government. His daughter, Mary Lue Hitt, carried on the family legacy as a "code girl" during World War II. Readers of Elizabeth Cobb's The Hello Girls, Liza Mundy's Code Girls, and David Kahn's The Codebreakers will find in Parker Hitt's story an insightful profile of an American cryptologic hero and the early twentieth-century military. Drawing from a never-before-seen cache of Hitt's letters, photographs, and diaries, Smoot introduces readers to Hitt's life on the front lines, in classrooms and workshops, and at home.

Betsy Rohaly Smoot is an intelligence historian interested in early twentieth-century cryptology and communications who has published articles in both *Cryptologia* and *Intelligence and National Security*. She retired from the Center for Cryptologic History of the National Security Agency in 2017.







A Memoir of the World War II Refugee Crisis

Following the German occupation of France in 1940, French women moved deftly into the jobs and roles left by their male compatriots—even the role of soldier. In *Lieutenant Sonia Vagliano: A Memoir of the World War II Refugee Crisis*, Vagliano provides a gripping and compelling account of how her team of young French women was attached to a US First Army unit that arrived in Normandy two weeks after D-Day. From 1943 to 1945, Vagliano followed her unit from Normandy to Paris, through Belgium, and finally into Germany, where they cared for 41,000 total displaced persons and prisoners of war.


Vagliano not only describes her experiences in rich detail—from caring for thousands of refugees in the worst possible conditions to defusing landmines and being kidnapped, shot at, torpedoed, and bombed—she also recounts the major events of the war in Europe, including the liberation of Paris, the Battle of the Bulge, and finally, the liberation of the concentration camps. Spending five weeks at Buchenwald repatriating the 21,000 remaining prisoners, she is a unique witness to the transition period between the camp's liberation and its transferal to Russian oversight in July 1945. She saw firsthand "to what extremes the human imagination can go in its search for the most cruel methods of torture."

Striking a balance between daredevil escapades and the sobering reality of a wartime account, this book won the Prix Saint-Simon for best memoir under its original title, *Les demoiselles de Gaulle*. Now, translator and editor Martha Noel Evans brings the young French lieutenant's story to readers in English for the first time.

Sonia Vagliano Eloy (1922–2002) was a lieutenant in the Free French Army during World War II. She received the Bronze Star and the Croix de Guerre and was made an officer of the Légion d'honneur. Her memoir, *Les demoiselles de Gaulle*, is based on a diary she kept during her service, official documents, and letters she had written home.

Martha Noel Evans is a retired women's studies and French professor and former director of book publications at the Modern Language Association. She is the author of *Fits and Starts: A Genealogy of Hysteria in Modern France* and *Masks of Tradition: Women and the Politics of Writing in Twentieth-Century France*.






Southern Voices: Biet Dong and the National Liberation Front presents oral histories from former members of an elite squad of Viet Cong operatives, focusing on their experiences during what is known, in Vietnam, as the American War. Author Michael Robert Dedrick conducted interviews with eight former Biet Dong (the equivalent of Ranger or Special Forces divisions in the US military) and sheds new light on this clandestine group.

Best known for their role in the 1968 Tet Offensive, the Biet Dong in the south were organized units hiding in plain sight. Members included farmers, tradespeople, agents, spies, monks, students, intellectuals, and journalists—both young and old, men and women. They were highly patriotic, politically motivated, and very secretive, operating in three-person cells under aliases. Their voices and experiences emerge in this bilingual volume.

In recent years, historians have made greater use of Vietnamese primary sources and transformed the study of one of the twentieth century's most controversial conflicts. Ably curated by Dedrick—who also offers his own perspectives as a veteran and peace activist—the firsthand accounts in *Southern Voices* add a new layer to the history of the Vietnam War and its aftermath.

Michael Robert Dedrick is vice president of Veterans for Peace Chapter 92, located in Seattle, Washington. He served during the Vietnam War as a US Army analyst and interrogator-linguist in Cholon, Saigon, through the Tet and May Offensives of 1968. His work has previously appeared in the *Mekong Review*.
