He is the author, editor, or co-editor of four books, and more than forty articles, essays, and book reviews published in historical journals and encyclopedias. He has appeared in historical documentaries which have aired on CBS, NBC, KET, TruTV and the CBS Sports Network. He is editor of Slavery and Freedom in the Bluegrass State: Revisiting My Old Kentucky Home and co-editor of the award-winning The Kentucky African American Encyclopedia.



**Derrick E. White**, professor of history and African American and Africana Studies, specializes in sports history, civil rights, and Black Power. He is the author of *The Challenge of Blackness: The Institute of the Black World and Political Activism in the 1970s*, which examines how scholar-activists continued the Black Freedom Movement through the creation of Black Studies and Black electoral politics. His most recent book, *Blood, Sweat, and Tears: Jake Gaither, Florida A&M, and the History of Black College Football,* looks at how Black colleges developed athletic programs amid segregation and the effect of integration on HBCU football programs.




