
# Northeast African Studies CALL FOR PAPERS

Northeast African Studies (NEAS) has for decades published high quality research on the Horn of Africa and its neighbors. NEAS is a biannual interdisciplinary peer-reviewed journal that publishes original research in the social sciences and the humanities on the Horn of Africa and its neighbors. The region covers primarily Ethiopia, Eritrea, Sudan, South Sudan, Djibouti, and Somalia/Somaliland. We welcome submissions from a range of academic disciplines including history, anthropology, political science, sociology, religion, literature and the arts. As we continue this tradition of excellence, we invite submissions of original research and proposals for special issues that further the study of the region in innovative ways.



#### **Individual Papers**

NEAS seeks contributions that helps us better understand contemporary dynamics in the region and that also inform broader scholarly discourses and be of value for scholars working in other parts of the world. We are particularly interested in studies adopting transnational, transregional, and comparative perspectives to Northeast Africa that transcends the conventional borders of individual countries. We also encourage submissions that explore the region's broader interactions with the Red Sea and Indian Ocean areas, and the adjacent Arabian Peninsula, or that converse with global history approaches.

#### **Special Issues**

We are in addition welcoming Special Issue Proposals that addresses emerging and underexplored themes in Northeast African Studies. Prospective Guest-Editors should directly contact the Editor. Possible themes include, but are in no way limited to:

- Trajectories of regional conflicts
- Women, gender, history, and politics in Northeast Africa
- Religion, intra- and inter-religious dynamics
- Northeast Africa and the Red Sea area
- Ethnic discourses, demarcations, and delineations
- Commodity chains and trans-local histories (coffee, textiles, marine products)
- Visions, formations, and contestation of the State
- Northeast Africa and global dynamics
- Migrations, border, and borderlands
- Politics of development
- New visual cultures in Northeast Africa
- Intellectual networks, scholarly traditions, knowledge production and transmission
- Northeast African diasporas
- Slavery and the slave trades in Northeast Africa/the Red Sea area
- Piracy, smuggling, contraband and other illicit mobilities/circulations
