
A Player to Remember

- In baseball, April 15 is Jackie Robinson Day. Players across the country wear number 42. They honor a great player who changed their sport. Robinson played his first Major League Baseball¹ game on April 15, 1947. He wore the number 42 on his uniform. But who was Jackie Robinson? And why is he honored?
- **(2)** Jackie Robinson was born in 1919. He was a talented athlete. In college, he played football, basketball, and baseball. Then, in 1942, he joined the U.S. Army. He served for two years.
- (3) At that time, life in the United States was not easy. African Americans, like Robinson, were often treated unfairly. Laws in some places forced black people to be separate from white people. Once, Robinson was asked to sit in the back of a military bus. This request was made just because he was black. He refused.



Robinson continued to play even though some players said they didn't want to play with an African-American player.

¹ Major League Baseball (n): leagues, or groups, of professional baseball teams; it is the highest level of baseball in the United States

- 4 That event affected Robinson. He felt inspired. He wanted to fight for equal rights for all people. Little did he know what a difference he would make.
- (5) In 1947, Robinson became the first African American to play for a Major League Baseball team in the 20th century. Robinson faced harsh treatment from other players and fans. But he stayed strong. And he played well. He was the National League's Rookie of the Year in 1947. Two years later, he was

the league's Most Valuable Player (MVP). Another year, he led the Brooklyn Dodgers to a World Series² win.

- for all African-American baseball players. He stopped playing in 1957. But he continued to fight for equal rights. He appeared at civil rights events. And he gave speeches. He inspired many people.
- Robinson died in 1972.
 Years later, his number, 42,
 was retired. No other players
 could wear that number.
 Except for on Jackie
 Robinson Day, of course.
