

# Why an Annual Report?

One year ago, we distributed our first Annual Report. I'll admit it was a bit of an experiment, and it required no small amount of work. We made scores of decisions about what to include in the report, how to design it, and where to send it. But more fundamentally, we had never produced a report like this in the past. Why did we think we needed one now?

Your feedback overwhelmingly provided the response. It wasn't simply that we heard praise from readers about our accomplishments for that year (although we're always delighted to hear such praise). But the report generated a collective astonishment about the scope of activities that are under way here at the University of North Carolina Press.

This year, we once again published more than 100 books and 12 journals, but as you read through this report, you will see that we also engaged with a diverse set of communities—readers, authors, researchers, librarians, administrators, benefactors, and neighbors. It's a privilege for us to be members of these communities, and like any good neighbor, we want to play a key role in improving them. This year's Annual Report provides particular emphasis on the staff who are making that happen.

## Sales and Financial Results

Since we are primarily self-funded through sales revenues, we closely monitor and review our sales performance. While Fiscal Year (FY) 2018 was one of our strongest ever, FY 2019 has been much more in line with recent trends. Our business is driven by purchases from academic libraries, individual scholars, students, and—for our trade list—general consumers. Print revenue continues to dominate, accounting for 85% of all sales, with digital making up the remaining 15%. Our new books ("frontlist") were responsible for 33%, with backlist accounting for 67%. # Books Published and Promoted in 2018

The largest section of this report catalogs the new books published last year (see pages 16–27). Our title count continues to be at record high levels, and if you measure quality by awards, then we continue to set records there as well. Pages 28–29 showcase our many winners, and 2018 marked the second year in a row that one of our titles won the prestigious Bancroft Prize.

# Diversity/Equity/Inclusion

Publishing has always suffered from a lack of diversity within its professional ranks, and UNC Press is not immune to this challenge. While our author pool and the breadth of our books are a source of pride, the makeup of our staff does not reflect this diversity. Our trade association, the Association of University Presses, has launched a number of initiatives to address this industrywide problem (they can be found on their website, www.aupresses.org/resources/). At UNC Press, we are also developing efforts customized for our own local needs. In addition to our expanding financial investments in human resources and funding internal training initiatives, the staff has organized at a grassroots level to create eight working groups and launched monthly workshops focused on diversity, equity, and inclusion. This will be an effort that requires years of sustained focus, but it is fundamental to the long-term future of the Press.

# Longleaf Services Continues to Expand

Our wholly owned affiliate, Longleaf Services (see page 31), is a collaborative back-end platform created to provide scaled publishing services for UNC and other university presses. In 2018 we welcomed three new fulfillment clients and continued to expand the suite of services on offer.

# Office of Scholarly Publishing Services Making an Impact

Created four years ago, the Office of Scholarly Publishing Services (see page 32) supports university-based publishing throughout the seventeen-campus UNC System, as well as nonprofit organizations in the state. By continuing to expand its reach, OSPS is helping UNC Press diversify its revenue sources while increasing its impact and value throughout the state and the university system.

# A Note of Thanks to Our Many Friends

Annual giving continues to be a vital factor in the Press's success, and we're very grateful for the many benefactors who made 2018 a record-setting year in development. In particular, the announcement of the \$3 million Wyndham Robertson Editorial Directorship marked the most ambitious fund-raising initiative in our history. # **Transitions**

We were saddened this year with the passing of the indomitable Mildred Council, known to her many fans as Mama Dip. This beloved cook, entrepreneur, storyteller, and community member wrote two of our most successful trade books, and we have always been incredibly proud to be her publisher. The philanthropist Richard Jenrette also passed away this year. Dick was a supporter of the Press for decades, and we're proud that the many books published in the Richard Hampton Jenrette Series in Architecture and the Decorative Arts will be an enduring legacy to him. In more salubrious changes, we celebrated the retirement of Marjorie Fowler after a forty-two-year career at the Press. Marjorie didn't just see change happening—she frequently led the charge on adapting to the new tools of publishing. She has inspired all of us to be ready to embrace change and always evolve.

### The Future

Publishing indeed continues to change rapidly, so any projections about the future should be an exercise in caution. We intend to continue growing our title counts and revenue from our book and journal programs. Fund-raising will remain an area of emphasis, including a very exciting announcement we'll be making early in 2019 that will have direct impact on the scope of our most public-facing trade books.

We also have significant ambitions to explore an innovative new approach to how we publish our most specialized monographs. Having just wrapped up a \$1 million grant from the Mellon Foundation to expand the suite of services at Longleaf, we are embarking this year on our second \$1 million Mellon grant to support open digital editions of new monographs. The Sustainable History Monograph Pilot has us partnering with twenty-one other university presses to implement web-based workflows to publish open digital editions of some our leading monographs.

UNC Press is uniquely poised to lead on efforts such as this. Our reputation for excellence, paired with our financial stability, puts us in a position of privilege. And with that privilege comes the responsibility to advance the communities we inhabit. I hope that as you read through this year's Annual Report, you will see the many examples of us doing just that.

### About the Press


The University of North Carolina Press, a nonprofit publisher of both scholarly and general-interest books and journals, operates simultaneously in a business environment and in the world of scholarship and ideas. The Press advances the university's triple mission of teaching, research, and public service by publishing first-rate books and journals for students, scholars, and general readers. The Press has earned a distinguished reputation by publishing excellent work from the nation's leading scholars, writers, and intellectuals and by presenting that work effectively to wide-ranging audiences.

Established in 1922, UNC Press was the first university press in the South and one of the first in the nation. Our regional publishing program—aimed at general readers and offering engaging, authoritative work on all aspects of the region's history and culture, its natural and built environment, and its music, food, literature, geography, and plant and animal life—has been widely adopted in other parts of the country. Over the years, Press books have won hundreds of prestigious awards including the Pulitzer Prize and the National Book Award and those of many national scholarly societies. Today, the imprint of UNC Press is recognized worldwide as a mark of publishing excellence—both for what we publish and for how we publish. Because of our respected authors who rely on the Press to connect readers with important ideas, the name of the university is carried on Press books and journals across the country and around the globe, in both print and digital formats.

# Sources of Income


The chart below is meant to capture the many sources of income here at UNC Press and how the diversity of these income streams insulates us from short term fluctuations in any one part of the operation. Within these different streams of income, there are three general categories.

The Press operates primarily as a cost-recovery enterprise with proceeds coming from a variety of different business units. These proceeds cover approximately 80% of our expenses. The bulk of that comes from the sales of books and journals (76%) with the balance coming through subsidiary rights and publishing services activities (4%).

The second category is the support we receive through the state and university system, which accounts for 7% of our income.

Finally, we have a robust development program that supports an endowment and annual giving initiatives, generating the final 13%.

# Board of Governors

The Board of Governors of the UNC Press is a body of nineteen members, fifteen of whom are elected by the Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina and four of whom serve ex officio, charged with the responsibility of directing the affairs of the Press. This includes establishing and monitoring all policies and programs for the maintenance, operation, and improvement of the Press, including its publishing policies and projects and its budget and financial policies.

A member's responsibilities include attending board meetings; reviewing and voting on approval of monographs, series, and other publishing projects of the Press; consulting with and advising the director of the Press on matters of financial and publishing policy and strategy; and serving as needed on ad hoc or standing committees.

# The Departments of the Press

With almost forty full-time employees, the staff manages all aspects of our business, including the full range of the publishing process. Their efforts can be broken into five primary departments.

The Acquisitions department oversees the development of the list of books to be published. A full description of the team that acquires our books can be found on pages 10–11.

The Manuscript Editorial department is responsible for editing and shepherding through production the manuscripts accepted for publication. The Design and Production department is responsible for the physical appearance of the book and supervises design and typesetting as well as manufacture by outside firms.

The Marketing department is responsible for advertising, direct mail, exhibits, publicity, promotion, and the sales of books and journals.

General Administration includes management, finance, operations, information technology, development, and publishing services.

### Dear Friends:

As an editor, if asked to tell the story of my past year, I would reflexively start with the remarkable books published by the authors with whom I had the honor of working. I suspect that the other members of the Press's acquisitions editorial team would do the same. But as I look back on my seventh year as editorial director, I have come to appreciate how incomplete a picture that may offer.

To be sure, much of our labor, imagination, and attention in 2018 was focused on the diverse list of books presented a few pages ahead in this report. But we would also cite the manuscripts we guided through development, review, and approval by the Press's Board of Governors, which are now in the hands of colleagues for publication over the next twelve months. Beyond, we would highlight some 120 new works put under contract for future seasons. The story of our year is woven in the fabric of relationships, ideas, words, and images necessary to acquire, develop, and publish more than 100 books a year—books representing multiple disciplines and methodologies, intended for readers inside and outside the academy.

The fuller version of this story includes the joy we feel when our authors' books are recognized with favorable reviews and awards from their peers. In 2018, we took special pride when Julio Capo Jr.'s Welcome to Fairyland: Queer Miami before 1940 was recognized with six awards, including the Southern Historical Association's Charles E. Sydnor Award as best book in Southern history. And validating several years' efforts to strengthen and expand our list in American studies, Kelly Lytle Hernandez's City of Inmates: Conquest, Rebellion, and the Rise of Human Caging in Los Angeles, 1771–1965 won the American Studies Association's John Hope Franklin Book Prize. The Press last won this prize in 2002; the honor is especially great because of its association with the pathbreaking historian John Hope Franklin—UNC Press author, friend, and namesake for our premier book series in African American history and culture.

Looking to the future, our team acquired several new books that will be published in enhanced and open-access digital editions in the months ahead. We see innovations in digital humanities and open-access publishing as a growing part of our reality, and we are excited about what we'll learn from guiding these

new works toward publication. We also expanded our presence as a publisher of ethnographic work in the humanities and social sciences, signing to contract the first books in our tentatively titled "Ethnographies of Religion" series. And looking to build on our strengths in humanities and regional publishing, we laid groundwork for a new presence at the Association of Writers and Writing Programs annual meeting.

The story of 2018 also includes an increased emphasis on service to our profession and the academy writ large. To cite a few examples: all five of the Press's acquiring editors conducted workshops for graduate students and junior faculty on campuses that included UNC–Chapel Hill, North Carolina State University, Harvard University, the University of Virginia, and Penn State University. We offered professional development talks twice to the cohort of UNC–Chapel Hill's Mellon Postdoctoral Fellows for Faculty Diversity. And members of our team were active in presenting at the annual meeting of the Association of University Presses.

In closing, I wish to acknowledge the exceptional honor of being named the Press's inaugural Wyndham Robertson Editorial Director last spring. Wyndham Robertson is a tireless champion for UNC Press, and her many accomplishments as a publisher and higher education leader are a source of daily inspiration. Authors, colleagues, and friends have asked often what holding this endowed chair means. My answer is simple: it reminds me how fortunate I am to guide the Press's editorial program and reinforces the responsibility I feel to maintain its excellence. I hope you will agree that it is reflected clearly in the books we published in 2018, in our immediate and long-term future, and in the extraordinary work of my talented colleagues.

# Mark Simpson-Vos, Editorial Director

Mark joined the Press staff in 1998 and has been editorial director since 2011. He oversees the strategic direction and day-to-day work of the acquisitions editorial team. He also acquires a diverse list of general-interest and scholarly books, including work in the fields of history, American studies, Native American and Indigenous studies, gender and sexuality, southern culture, and the history of the Civil War era.

## Chuck Grench, Executive Editor

Chuck joined the Press staff in 2000 after twenty-five years at Yale University Press. He acquires books in the field of history for general readers, scholars, and students. He is especially focused on African American history and culture, the history of borderlands, Cold War history, diplomatic and political history, early American studies, southern history, and the history of the American West.

### Elaine Maisner, Executive Editor

Elaine joined the Press in 1994 after working previously at Yale University Press and Tokyo University Press. She acquires books for scholars and general readers in the fields of religious studies and Latin American and Caribbean studies. She also acquires general-interest books about North Carolina and the South; her specialties include cookbooks, foodways, gardening, and natural history, as well as books about pressing contemporary concerns in southern life.

### Brandon Proia, Senior Editor

Brandon joined the Press in 2013 after working previously in magazine and trade publishing. He acquires scholarly and general-interest books in history, and he is particularly interested in histories of race, environment, politics, social movements, capitalism, empire, and ideas.

# Lucas Church, Editor

Lucas joined the Press staff in 2013. He acquires books for the Press's regional trade list, including guidebooks, narrative nonfiction, and literary anthologies. He is broadly interested in books that bring to life the South's rich musical, artistic, architectural, and literary legacies. He also acquires scholarly and crossover books in the fields of literary studies, sociology, and social medicine.

# Jessica Newman, Associate Editor

Jessica worked previously as an acquisitions editor at Carolina Academic Press before joining the UNC Press staff in 2015. Her acquisitions focus is on the interdisciplinary field of gender and sexuality studies. She also collaborates closely with Mark Simpson-Vos in his areas of acquisition.

# Cate Hodorowicz, Acquisitions Manager



Based at Berea College, *Appalachian Heritage* showcases the work of emerging and established writers throughout Appalachia, offering its readers literature that is thoughtful, innovative, and revelatory.

The Comparatist focuses on the comparative study of literature, cultural movements, and the arts, as well as literary and cultural theory.

With a focus on literature published through the early national period, *Early American Literature* is the journal of the Modern Language Association's Division on American Literature to 1800.

Published by UNC at Chapel Hill's School of Education, *The High School Journal* explores the broad and complex field of secondary education.

The Journal of Best Practices in Health Professions Diversity: Research, Education, and Policy is published by Winston-Salem State University's School of Health Sciences and provides a forum to examine the development and sustainability of a diverse health professions workforce.

The Journal of the Civil War Era, published in association with the George and Ann Richards Civil War Era Center at Penn State University, offers a fresh perspective on the struggles that defined this period and, by extension, the course of American history.

Produced by East Carolina University, the *North Carolina Literary Review* publishes poetry, fiction, and nonfiction by North Carolina writers, as well as interviews, articles, and essays about the state's authors, literary history, and writing culture.

Published by UNC at Chapel Hill's Department of American Studies, south: a scholarly journal features global and hemispheric comparative scholarship linking the American South to other Souths.

The journal of the Southeastern Division of the American Association of Geographers, *Southeastern Geographer*, publishes research about the South, broadly construed, as it relates to broader geographical reaches.

Housed in UNC at Chapel Hill's Center for the Study of the American South, *Southern Cultures* explores the history, politics, folklore, literature, and art of the South.

















# The Office of Scholarly Publishing Services

The Press's Office of Scholarly Publishing Services (OSPS) opened three years ago with a goal of offering the University of North Carolina System campuses a range of sustainable, mission-driven publishing models. In 2018, OSPS and partners on six campuses published 70 new works and 160 reissues of out-of-print books. Our engagement with open-access projects grew and now includes numerous open textbooks with the potential to significantly lower student costs. As we build more connections across the system we are consistently impressed with the variety and quality of research and the publishing opportunities it offers.

# **EXTENSION**

In the spring the NC State Extension published the much-anticipated North Carolina Extension Gardener Handbook. This authoritative textbook for the Master Gardener volunteer course is an essential resource for serious gardeners and is widely available to the public for the first time. Written by a team of leading horticulture experts, it contains a wealth of information about creating and managing thriving gardens, lawns, and landscapes.



Published in 1939 by UNC Press, *Tobe* is a children's book portraying the life of an African American boy on a small farm. The book was written by a white woman and illustrated by staged photos of children from a rural area near Greensboro. The Center for the Study of the New South at UNC Charlotte and the Charlotte Teachers Institute hosted a symposium to explore *Tobe*, and to publish a collection of essays, *Why Does No One In My Books Look Like Me?*: "*Tobe*" and Ongoing Questions about Race, Representation, and Identity.

In the 1940s, the Department of Romance Studies at UNC at Chapel Hill started the North Carolina Studies in the Romance Languages and Literatures series. In December the series published volume 315. Over the decades 270 books went out of print and most had never been available digitally. In 2018 we completed a major initiative to reissue the books in new paperback and digital formats, making the series accessible to a new generation of scholars.












Through our Thomas W. Ross Fund Publishing Grants we committed to fund three more projects this year totaling \$6,250. This joins \$26,850 committed to or spent on eleven other projects. Western Carolina University will publish Mountain Days: A Journal of Camping Experiences in the Mountains of Tennessee and North Carolina, 1914—1938, a rare manuscript by Paul M. Fink. UNC Charlotte's J. Murrey Atkins Library published Miss Bonnie's Nurses: The First Fifty Years of Nursing at UNC Charlotte. East Carolina University used funding to promote the North Carolina Literary Review with booksellers and libraries in the state.

The Consortium in Latin American and Caribbean Studies at UNC and Duke received a Title VI renewal that included funding for the Studies in Latin America series. Title VI is a key area-studies grant given by the U.S. Department of Education, and the Consortium is the second largest Latin American studies program in the country. Tropical Tongues: Language Ideologies, Endangerment, and Minority Languages in Belize was the first book published in the series, which features very short monographs in open access formats.









Carter G. Woodson


The UNC at Chapel Hill Library has now published twenty-nine books under the DocSouth Book imprint that was launched in 2011. In September *The History of the Negro Church* by Carter Woodson was republished and has quickly outsold most of the books under the imprint. The book was previously unavailable in any other edition despite Woodson's stature as founding figure of African American history.



The Society for Early English and Norse Electronic Texts (SEENET) is a publishing initiative directed by Timothy Stinson, associate professor of English and a University Faculty Scholar at NC State University. SEENET will publish numerous scholarly editions of *Piers Plowman* in a series called the Piers Plowman Electronic Archive in Print, as well as other works.


