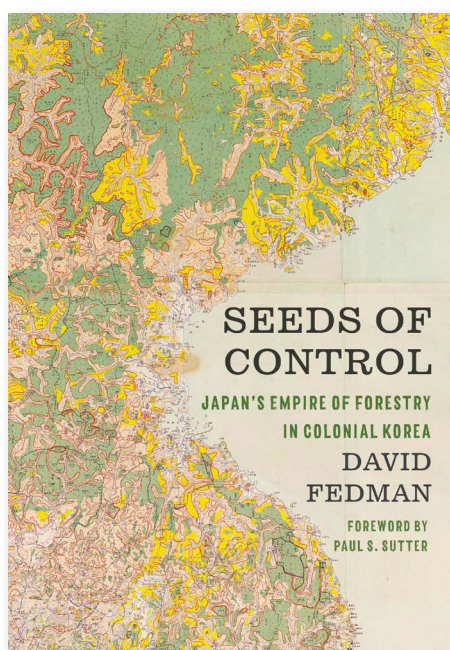

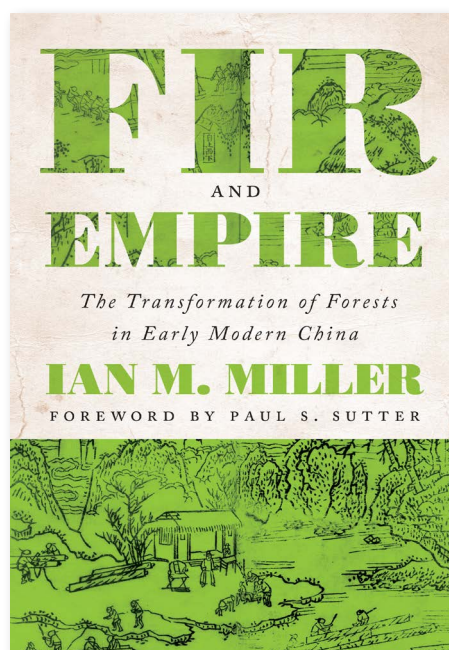
### Seeds of Control

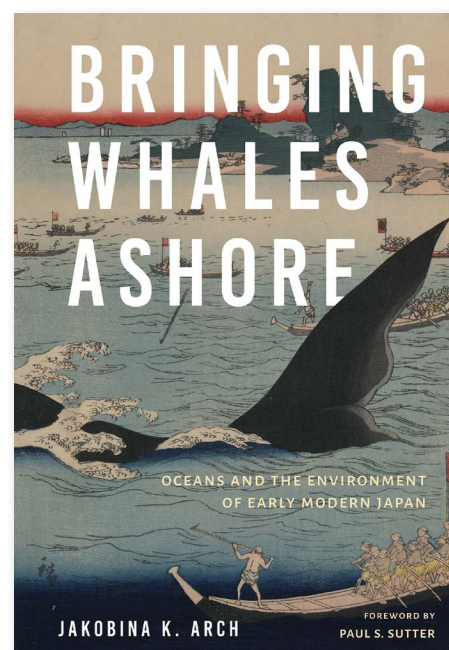
### Fir and Empire
